The idea of a Shakespeare Garden was conceived by Councillor G. Johnson the then chairman of the parks Committee and the garden was opened to the public by the Lord Mayor, Alderman W. Bowater on July 22nd, 1915.

The refurbishment of the garden commenced during October, 1986 by apprentices of the Department of Recreation and Community Services.

The garden is designed on an Elizabethan theme containing a "knot Garden", herb and fruit garden, and contains many of the plants mentioned in Shakespeare's plays.

The garden was formerly the kitchen garden to Lightwoods Hall which was the one time residence of Sir Francis Galton.
